

Opening Planned For January

Probably the single most important event in the history of Indian River Community College occurred over the summer with the acquisition of a new Stuart branch—free of charge.

The building and grounds were officially donated to the school on August 8 by John A. Roschman of Ft. Lauderdale, according to IRCC President Herman A. Heise.

Classes are scheduled to begin there by January, 1973.

The site represents the college's largest single facility outside of the main Ft. Pierce campus. "We've been after that for the past three years," Dr. Heise said.

The new branch site for the community college is on the west side of U. S. I, about three miles south of Stuart. It is a two-story cement-poured building constructed in 1939 by John W. Stokes of Stuart.

IRCC hopes to have at least six classrooms in operation before the start of the Spring semester, according to Joseph Colville. director of development for the college. The building, which has never been occupied, will be air conditioned and used for both day and evening classes.

The building is in need of extensive repairs to be made suitable for classroom use. College maintenance workers, and also Colville and his two sons, John and Jeff, were on hand as early as August 19 to start the necessary clean-up operations.



Thanks to Local Donors

Construction Moves Forward On IRCC's Student Center

The long-awaited start of the student center expansion program became a reality recently when ground was broken on the \$360,000 addition.

A donation of \$24,000 from First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Ft. Pierce two months ago paved the way for construction to start. With this donation, the needed \$240,000 to begin construction of phase one (the shell) was received.

Contributions received total \$240,295.81. Counties and their donations are: Indian River, \$53,357; Martin, \$47,519; St.

Lucie, \$126,919.81, and Okeechobee, \$12,500.

St. Lucie County has constantly held the lead since the fund drive began more than a year ago.

The largest room in the Student Center will be named after the county which contributes the most money to the new building.

Since 1970, the State Legislature will not permit state appropriations for student center construction. The college can, through local donations, carry out the task of raising money.

(continued from page 1) tration, and Colville inspected the grounds on August 12. John W. Muir, dean of instruction, is currently working on class schedules for the Stuart facility, while keeping in mind the specific needs of Martin County residents.

On signing the agreement, donor Roschman stated, "I like community colleges and I like what Indian River is doing for the people in its service district. Community colleges are close to the people they serve and respond to their needs.

"I can't think of any better way to serve Martin County than to help Indian River Community College provide educational services to the county. I have already made substantial investments in Martin County and the future of it and its people are important to me," Roschman added.

Dr. Heise commented, "Mr. Roschman's community spirit makes it possible for the college to do something it has had in mind for a long time. With this site, we will be able to increase our service to the people of Martin County. We have been watching the growth pattern in the area and the property recently donated is in an ideal location for our purposes."

The branch will be named the John A. Roschman Site of Indian River Community College.

Prior to acquisition of the new site, about ten evening classes were held in Martin County at the Stuart Middle School.
